Griffith ENACTUS is working in partnership with Charlie Does Surf Shack, the Australian Embassy and Filipino surf lifesaving organisations to cultivate a sustainable and holistic water safety project in the Philippines. Batang Pating focuses on youth water safety in coastal provinces and aims to create a generational change surrounding perceptions of beach culture.

ENTREPRENEURIAL APPROACH

After completing a needs assessment, we identified the need for a unique three tier project which encompasses learn to swim, education and surf lifesaving in coastal provinces. This will be achieved through meaningful relationships with partners and the local community. We are working closely with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Tourism to ensure this project unites various organisations who are currently working independently on water safety across the Philippines.

EFFECTIVE EMPOWERMENT

- » Adopts a train the trainer approach to ensure sustainability
- » Provides the community with a safe environment on the beach
- » Connects independent organisations with common goals to develop collaborative networks with broader reach

- » Educating locals to become internationally accredited surf life savers

- » Bridges the gap between independent water safety organisations
- » Engages the local community to join a surf lifesaving club
- » Creates an international partnership

- » Creating an infrastructure which supports a boost in tourism, and indirectly the potential for increased income



MENTORS IN VIOLENCE PREVENTION

Domestic violence is the leading cause of death for women aged 15-44. In 2015, 79 Australian women were killed. As of June 25 2016, 34 women have been killed already this year. The total annual cost of domestic violence is over \$13 billion.



EFFECTIVE EMPOWERMENT

Griffith ENACTUS is giving members of the community the tools to recognize and assist those suffering from domestic violence.

FOOD WASTE CHALLENGE

Thanks to the CHEP grant awarded at ENACTUS Nationals in 2015, the Griffith Club has enthusiastically engaged in the Brambles Food Waste Challenge using the education of staff and students to enact change and reduce waste.

ENTREPRENEURIAL APPROACH

Long-term Helping Hands partners helped raise awareness and inspire action for change through an educational workshop called 'What-a-waste'. The CHEP grant allowed the plans of 'What-a-waste' attendees to become a reality, for example, donating a worm-farm to the Nerang Community Garden. The impact of the project was bolstered by working alongside Griffith University Catering food waste reduction initiatives. Griffith Enactus incorporated a formerly absent food waste component to Griffith's sustainability website.



EFFECTIVE EMPOWERMENT

- » Provides students and staff with skills and knowledge of food waste and sustainable solutions
- » Facilitates the sustainability of local initiatives including the Beelarong Community Farm, Nerang Community Garden, and Griffith University food waste reduction plans

LIVELIHOOD ASSETS

NATURAL

- » Inform students and staff on current food waste trends
- » Foster environmental sustainability through knowledge and hands on tools to manage food waste – worm farm and compost bin

SOCIAL

- » Community engagement and multi-level networking through practical food waste demonstrations

FINANCIAL

- » Awareness of the cost of food waste allows Griffith students and staff to save money by reducing the amount of unnecessary food they buy
- » Reduction in cost by offering unsold bread from a local Baker's Delight
- » Reduced cost of food through self-sustaining community farms

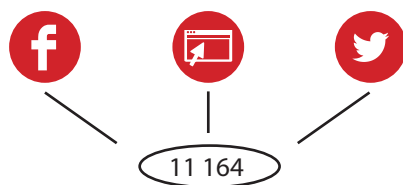
